

### DEFINITION OF TRANSITION SERVICES


"a coordinated set of activities for a student that -

(A) is designed to be within a results-oriented process that is focused on improving the academic and functional achievement of the child with a disability to facilitate the child's movement from school to post-school activities, including post-secondary education, vocational education, integrated employment (including supported employment), continuing and adult education, adult services, independent living, or community participation."


## DEFINITION OF TRANSITION SERVICES

- (B) based on the individual child's needs, taking into account the child's strengths, preferences, and interests; and
- (C) includes <u>instruction</u>, <u>related services</u>, <u>community experiences</u>, <u>the development of employment and other post-school adult living objectives</u>, and when appropriate, acquisition of daily living skills and functional vocational evaluation. (Section 602, (34).

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## CAREER COUNSELING

- Counseling and guidance/information and referral: VR counselors will offer assistance and coordinate
  client services consistent with individual employment goals and provide information regarding other
  available services.
- **Job search skill development:** Guidance in work-search activities, such as resume writing, interviewing, travel, and the job search.
- Placement services: Through one-on-one assistance, customers develop job search and interviewing skills, obtain job leads, and receive support during the job search. Depending on the customer's needs, placement services may include interviewing skills training, soft skills training, on-the-job training (OJT), supported employment (SE), or time-limited job coaching (TLJC).

### SUPPORTED EMPLOYMENT

- Time-Limited Job Coaching (TLJC): One-on-one assistance in applying for jobs and/or on-the-job coaching after a job is obtained. Services are time-limited.
- Supported Employment (SE): Customers who require an intensive level of job coaching are referred to a supported employment provider for one-on-one assistance in job searching, interviewing skills training, and applying for jobs. The supported employment provider delivers on-the-job coaching to assist the customer in learning job duties and adjusting to the work environment. SE also includes periodic follow-up to make sure the consumer retains his or her job.
- Visit Community Rehabilitation Programs to learn more about SE.

### FINANCIAL ASSESSMENT AND PLANNING

- **Benefits counseling:** Clients who are recipients of SSD/SSI benefits may be referred for Work Incentive Planning and Assistance counseling (WIPA) to determine how working may affect their benefits. Benefits counseling is provided through NJWI NS or Full Circle Employment Solutions.
- Financial needs assessments: Assesses financial needs of the customer for acquisition of services. DVRS provides "Cost" and "No Cost" services.

## FINANCIAL ASSESSMENT AND PLANNING

### Examples of "No Cost" services:

- counseling and guidance
- job search assistance
- job coaching
- follow along services
- diagnostic evaluations
- Interpreting services for the Deaf.

### Examples of "Cost" Services:

- funding for postsecondary education
- technical skills training
- vehicle modification
- hearing aid purchases
- assistive technology obtainment

### TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES

- College training: Support for participating in a two- or four-year program that leads to a
  degree. Funding may include tuition, fees, books, supplies, room and board, assistive
  technology, interpreting services or CART services for the Deaf, and support services,
  depending on need and financial eligibility. Students are expected to attend school within the
  State of New Jersey.
- Driver training: Helps consumers purchase driver training lessons if the lessons are needed for work purposes.
- Skills training: Vocational school, technology or trade school, and business school training.

# JOB ACCOMMODATIONS/EQUIPMENT AND VEHICLE MODIFICATIONS

- Home modifications: Finds home modification services if the modifications are needed for work purposes.
- Job accommodations: Employer is advised on worksite accommodations for the employee or provided equipment and assistive technology that will allow an individual to do work tasks more independently, effectively, and safely.
- Mobility equipment: Services include referral for evaluation to determine mobility needs and recommended equipment/assistive technology.
- Vehicle modifications: Car and van equipment modifications.

#### Rowan University "How to apply for accommodations in college"

- Disability Resources provides accommodations and assistance to students with various documented disabilities in accordance with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990. Students who meet University admissions requirements (i.e., otherwise qualified to attend the University) are required to submit appropriate documentation so that the University can determine whether they qualify for reasonable accommodations.
- The staff coordinate and ensure accessible classes, use of assistive technology, audiotaped books (when available), examination administration in cooperation with the instructor, as well as other services as deemed necessary.

#### **Adult Center for Transition (ACT)**

 The Adult Center for Transition (ACT) is a post-secondary experience that prepares young adults with disabilities to become independent, contributing members of society. By focusing on student goals and strengths, ACT provides targeted academic, social and vocational education to prepare each graduate for tomorrow's competitive workforce.

#### **Disability Rights of New Jersey**

- is a private, non-profit, consumer-directed organization established to:
- Advocate for and advance the human, civil and legal rights of citizens of New Jersey with
- Advise and assist persons with disabilities, family members, attorneys and guardians in obtaining and
  protecting the rights of individuals with disabilities; and Provide education, training and technical assistance
  to individuals with disabilities.

# TRANSITION SERIES: FEBRUARY WASHINGTON TOWNSHIP HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS, FAMILIES, STAFF The Division of Developmental Disabilities

provides public funding for <u>services and supports</u> that assist New Jersey adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities <u>age 21 and older</u> to live as independently as possible. Services and supports are available in the community from independent providers, and in five staterun <u>developmental centers</u>.

### **New Jersey ACCESS Link**

 Access Link is a public transportation service established to comply with the paratransit regulations of the ADA. Access Link service is comparable to the NJ TRANSIT local fixed route bus and light rail systems. Access Link is for people with disabilities who are unable to use the local fixed route bus for some or all of their rides.

### **Guardianship And Supported Decision Making: Just The Basics**

• Guardianship can be a valuable tool to protect individuals who don't or no longer possess the ability to make appropriate personal or financial decisions for themselves.
