

⇒ Use all equipment, materials, and supplies properly and responsibly.




⇒ All electronic devices (this also includes accessories such as earbuds and headphones) not to be used unless given permission otherwise.

Grades

Projects (50%)

All major projects, assignments, and tests.

❖ At the introduction of each assignment, you will be shown a project information sheet which will include a rubric, expectations, and due date. The rubric will also include other goals and parameters specific to each assignment, as well as how your grade will be affected if submitted late.

- Time management is essential for success, so use your time in class wisely. Plan, concentrate, and focus on your work. Ample time is given for the completion of projects and assignments.
- If you feel that you are falling behind on an assignment for any reason, it is <u>your responsibility</u> to arrange for extra time (either after school, at home, or during lunch/study hall periods) to work on that assignment.
- Remember, taking equipment home is a huge responsibility- once that equipment leaves this classroom, you are solely responsible for it. Please be extremely cautious in transporting it to and from class.

Classwork, Homework, & Quizzes (30%)

- Classwork- daily/weekly
- Homework or any other related research that I may assign for independent completion.
- Quizzes will also be counted in this category.

Participation (20%)

- Every week, you will receive a grade based on what you do and how you act in this class.
- ❖ It is calculated based on earning 4 points a day, 5 days a week, for a total of 20 points. The total number of participation points earned is then divided by 20 and the resulting percentage is your grade.

Example: Mary earned her full 20 points for the week, so her participation grade in Powerschool would be a 100 (20/20= 100%)

❖ Your weekly grade can, however, be subject to reduction for a variety of factors and reasons. Here are the things I look for when determining your weekly participation grades:

PARTICIPATION INCLUDES:

- 1. Preparation: Having all required materials for each day, such as your ID & handbook, organized notebook, assignments and/or homework, pencil/pen, etc.
- 2. Working Habits: Proper use of tools, equipment, and materials, following directions, staying on-task all period, appropriate use of technology, excellent effort, cleaning up, positive attitude, etc.
- 3. Class participation: Following classroom rules and/or procedures, not speaking or causing disruptions and/or distractions while I am teaching/speaking, appropriate conversations and noise levels during class time, etc.
