

LEA Plan for Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Service Pursuant to the Federal American Rescue Plan Act, Section 2001(i)

Introduction and Background

As announced in the New Jersey Department of Education (NJDOE)'s <u>April 28, 2021 broadcast</u>, in March 2021 President Biden signed the Federal <u>American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act</u>, Public Law 117-2, into law. The ARP Act provides an additional \$122 billion in Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ARP ESSER) to States and school districts to help safely reopen, sustain the safe operation of schools, and address the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on the nation's students. As with the previous ESSER funds available under the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act, and the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSA), the purpose of the additional funding is to support local educational agencies (LEAs) in preparing for and responding to the impacts of COVID-19 on educators, students, and families. Section 2001(i)(1) of the ARP Act requires each LEA that receives ARP ESSER funds to develop and make publicly available on the LEA's website, no later than 30 days after receiving ARP ESSER funds, a plan for the safe return to in-person instruction and continuity of services for all schools (Safe Return Plan) A Safe Return Plan is required of all fund recipients, including those that have already returned to in-person instruction. Section 2001(i)(2) of the ARP Act further requires that the LEA seek public comment on the Safe Return Plan and take those comments into account in finalization of the Safe Return Plan. Under the interim final requirements published in Volume 86, No. 76 of the Federal Register by the U.S. Department of Education (USDE), an LEA must periodically, but no less frequently than every six months through September 30, 2023, review and, as appropriate, revise its Safe Return Plan.

Pursuant to those requirements, **LEAs must submit to the NJDOE** and **post on their website their Safe Return Plans by June 24, 2021.** The NJDOE intends to make LEA ARP ESSER Fund applications available in EWEG on May 24, 2021 and LEAs will submit their Safe Return Plans to the NJDOE via EWEG. To assist LEAs with the development of their Safe Return Plans, the NJDOE is providing the following template.

This template incorporates the federally-required components of the Safe Return Plan. The questions in the template below will be included in the LEA ARP ESSER Fund application in EWEG. LEAs will submit responses to the questions within the LEA ARP ESSER Fund application in EWEG by June 24, 2021. The NJDOE hopes that this template will allow LEAs to effectively plan for that submission and to easily post the information to their websites as required by the ARP Act.

Note that on May 17, 2021, Governor Murphy <u>announced</u> that upon the conclusion of the 2020-2021 school year, portions of Executive Order 175 allowing remote learning will be rescinded, meaning that schools will be required to provide full-day, in-person instruction, as they were prior to the

COVID-19 Public Health Emergency. The NJDOE and New Jersey Department of Health will share additional information regarding State requirements or guidance for health and safety protocols for the 2021-2022 school year as it becomes available.

1. Maintaining Health and Safety

For each mitigation strategy listed below (A–H), please describe how the LEA will maintain the health and safety of students, educators, and other staff and the extent to which it has adopted policies, and a description of any such policies, on each of the following safety recommendations established by the CDC.

A. Universal and correct wearing of masks – Masks are not required to be worn unless an individual is required to do so due to COVID exposure or if students/staff return to school 5 days after being symptom/fever-free for 5 days.

B. Physical distancing (e.g., including use of cohorts/podding) – All students and staff returned to normal (pre-pandemic) schedules for the 22-23 school year. Physical distancing is not attainable in most classrooms or in general areas.

C. Handwashing and respiratory etiquette – We will continue to build time in our day for hand washing particularly at the elementary level and continue to provide direction on appropriate respiratory etiquette and sanitizing. Signage and reminders will be posted throughout the buildings.

D. Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation. Staff will follow standard procedures for routing cleaning and disinfection using approved District cleaning protocols and EPA approved cleaning products. Staff will regularly disinfect high touch areas. Hand sanitizer and sanitizing wipes will be present in classrooms, office spaces, etc. in District buildings. HVAC systems are carefully monitored for proper air flow, proper percentage out outside air and filter are changed regularly. MERV-13 filters are being used if possible.

- E. Contact tracing in combination with isolation and quarantine, in collaboration with the State, local, territorial, or Tribal health departments. Parents of students who are ill as well as staff who are ill are directed to follow District policy regarding absence due to illness. They will be directed to contact their healthcare provider and follow their direction. They will also be directed to contact the Gloucester County Department of Health regarding COVID illness.
- F. Diagnostic and screening testing. The District is no longer testing unvaccinated staff members due to the Governor's actions to lift the requirement.
- G. Efforts to provide vaccinations to educators, other staff, and students, if eligible. The District will continue to pass on information to our community that we receive from the New Jersey Department of Health regarding vaccinations and vaccination sites.
- H. Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to the health and safety policies. The District will continue to provide appropriate accommodations for students with disabilities as per individualized student plans.

2. Ensuring Continuity of Services

A. Describe how the LEA will ensure continuity of services, including but not limited to services to address students' academic needs and students' and staff's social, emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services.

We will provide academic, behavioral, social emotional learning (SEL) services to identified students and address needs through the New Jersey tiered systems of support. By utilizing NJTSS, we will continue to address needs (i.e., adverse childhood experiences, mental health concerns, trauma) through school counselors, student assistance coordinators, and transitional coaches/licensed mental health counselors. Curriculum teams will refine units, modify assessments, and adjust pacing guides to address key skills and focus on priority standards for ELA, math, science, etc. for the fall. Professional development for staff is planned, including professional learning communities, consultations, and turnkey training by district leaders. We continue to

foster SEL needs through our MTSS Committees/activities and utilize our SEL universal screener. Enhanced NJTSS for ELA/math will be sustained. A diagnostic screener for math/ELA and Start Strong results will identify students who need further supports. At-risk students will be assigned to professionals who will provide support in-person during and beyond the day.

3. Public Comment

The District will provide this document to the community for public comment via the District website, as required.
