



ASPIRE

A Smoking Prevention Interactive Experience (ASPIRE) is a free, bilingual, online curriculum, fully aligned with National Education Standards, as well as with 21st Century Skills, that helps middle and high school teens learn to be tobacco free while explaining the dangers of tobacco and nicotine use.



- •Students can earn a certificate of completion upon finishing the program. Click on "Student Log In" to begin.
- •Teachers/Administrators can see students' progress by logging in to the Admin site.

The program is evidence-based and tackles the full range of traditional and emerging products such as *e-cigs, hookah, JUUL and synthetic marijuana*. Assessments are imbedded and gauge users' knowledge before and after exposure to the curriculum.


Restorative Discipline Goals of the Restorative Code of Conduct

- 1. To prioritize learning and instruction
- 2. To promote mutual respect for all members of the school community
- 3. To ensure that students take full advantage of their educational opportunities
- 4. To create a safe environment for learning
- Tier 1: Minor Infractions Disrupting the orderly educational process of self or others
- Tier 2: Intermediate Infractions-Devaluing the importance of school and classroom attendance
- Tier 3: Major Infractions Engaging in unsafe, threatening or inappropriate behavior that may jeopardize the welfare of an individual or the school community
- Tier 4: Severe Infractions Engaging in egregious and/or criminal activity in the school that could result in harm to the school community

Restorative Practices Tutoring K-5

- 1. Built upon lessons in respect, responsibility, positive psychology, relation-building, and relationship-repairing
- 2. Learning will focus on controlling impulses, honing proper social skills, and developing character traits and social-emotional skills

Tier 2 Program: Students identified through a selection process using multiple criteria Students with disciplinary infractions will be required to attend
