This year's event was a record breaking endeavor. Over 450 volunteers assembled and sold 5,900 hoagies to clear \$48,000 to assist area families. All were record figures for the event.

The hoagie sale happens in multiple locations throughout the area and goes through multiple phases, but people are interested the most in helping to make the hoagies.

At this year's hoagie sale there were many volunteers who arrived bright and early hoping to get to have the best job offered, making the hoagies. With so many hoagie orders and so many helpers there wasn't enough room in the cafeteria for all of the tables needed to make the hoagies, so set up in the band room, part of the gym and the hallway outside of the gym and cafeteria were more tables for students to sit at.

The students at these tables make the hoagies in sort of an assembly line fashion. One student flattens the bread used for the hoagies, after that it gets passed down the table for the other students to put on the rest of the meats, cheeses, and vegetables.

The staff of *The Patriot* would like to apologize for the delay in getting out this first issue. Shifts in our membership led to numerous delays in producing the paper.


We also apologize to all of those people who participated in interviews and to those students whose accomplishments were covered in stories that never had the opportunity to run.

Jennifer Hubbard Visits WIHS

"What's my favorite book? Try asking a parent who's their favorite child," said author Jennifer Hubbard who visited Washington Township High School on March 14.

She spoke in the IMC to several English classes about her journey to becoming an author and followed the discussion by hosting a workshop to help aspiring writers develop their skills.

Hubbard has published three books that have the central theme of teen issues and hardships. *The Secret Year* is about Julia and Colt who are having a secret relationship, when Julia dies, Colt reads her notebook. Hubbard didn't see much literature about the aftermath of a suicide attempt and explores this topic in *Try Not to Breathe* by trying to answer the question: "if you get that far, how do you put yourself back together and be glad that you are alive?" Hubbard said. *Until It Hurts to Stop* portrays Hubbard's experiences of confronting the past of bullying and how bullying can come back to haunt us.

Hubbard shared her own experiences in middle school being bullied. She told the audience how the aftermath of bullying can be detrimental to people, even when they have grown up. "I didn't realize the way it affected the way I thought of myself and my relationships with others. There was a lot of assumptions I made about myself." Hubbard said.

Hubbard also shared her experience of being published. Hubbard was born in the New England area and moved to Philly at 17. She graduated with a degree in environmental science. She submitted stories since a young age just to get experience. She realized rejection was a very common thing in the world of writing but never gave up. She had saved all of her rejection slips, especially the ones that had a "nugget of hope" written at the bottom, these

nuggets were short pieces of criticism or words of encouragement. She was first published in the Sunday magazine of The *Hartford Current* after 5 tries of submitting short stories.

When she met with the publisher, she saw how lucky she was that her story stood out among the "slush pile" of stories that would be returned with rejection slips. When Hubbard decided to move onto novels she had a hard time coming up with ideas that would be successful.

"[I thought] why don't I try to write a book like that, that I loved and made me a reader?" Hubbard since then proved herself a very successful fiction writer.

"[In fiction] you can take real life things and focus in and look at other people's perspectives, emotions, and thought patterns," she said, "you don't have to stick with the facts."

At the workshop during period 5, Hubbard helped students learn how to develop their characters. Students were to come up with a list of facts or write a stream of consciousness of a character they made up. Hubbard shared that while some authors do this to develop their characters and plots, she 'wings it' as she is writing.

Advice Hubbard shared with aspiring writers would be to "read a lot and write a lot. See how the language is used and use it yourself."

For the volunteers who didn't get to work at the tables were either paper cutters or runners.

Some people designated as runners brought supplies to the hoagie tables as they ran out of ingredients. Meanwhile, the paper cutters worked to cut wrap for the over 5900 hoagies sold.

Then of course there were the people in the kitchens cutting tomatoes, slicing meat, and getting the cheese and meats ready.

All were equally very important jobs in the process.

At this year's hoagie sale the volunteers had made over three thousand five hundred hoagies in just a span of three hours. By nine o clock only eight hundred hoagies were left to be made.

"It's the fastest I ever remember making hoagies," said Mr. Jeffrey Snyder one of the eighth grade social studies teachers in OVMS.

All the profits of the Hoagie Sale help to financially aid families who are struggling to meet the costs of medical treatment for an aflicted family member. It's one of the reasons why so many people either turn out to make or purchase sandwiches.

"My favorite part is how everyone in Township come together to make the hoagies for the people in need," said Spencer Petro, an

Weather complicates emergency response

Imagine you are walking to your car after work, and a fire starts in the building behind you. You start running to your car, and you slip on an ice patch in the road. You open your car door and make it inside. You start to pull out of the parking lot, but you cannot see out of your windshield because of the heavy frost blocking your view. The fire is getting stronger and the firefighters are scrambling to clear the snow off of the fire hydrant to stop the flames in the sub-freezing temperature.

The increase in snowy weather this winter affected Washington Township and its citizens. The below freezing temperatures, icy driveways, and snow-covered streets all play a role in possibly being a detriment to the town's safety. The firefighters of the town, police officers, EMTs and other medical personal have had to take precautions for the weather.

There are many dangers that come with the hazardous weather conditions, and the firefighters of Washington Township have prepared and handled these conditions.

With the increase in snowy weather, the firefighters of the township have been preparing and expecting the worst possible sce-

narios. With the snow and ice come many dangers for the firefighters.

"There has surprisingly not been an increase in fires and emergencies because of the snow. It has been pretty much steady and usual." Mr. John Hoffman, Chief of the Fire Department said. It is suprising because "usually along with snowy weather conditions, more emergencies are expected."

According to Hoffman, the snow and cold temperatures also brings with it many dangers in responding to calls.

"The deep freezing conditions often cause water lines to break

and freeze, which then in turn renders the apparatus inoperable. On our trucks, we have pumps to keep the water in the tanks in case of fires, and we must continually drain the water from the pumps to keep them from breaking or freezing up." Hoffman said.

The Fire Department has placed more staff on duty, especially during the nights, in preparation for the harsh weather.

"We try to get as many people as possible to help out, it takes longer to get to emergencies and fires in the snow, so we need more people working." Hoffman explains about the necessary boosts for onduty firefighters.

During especially snowy conditions, the firefighters often try and come out to every call, making sure the townspeople are as safe as possible and that situations are resolved "quickly and effectively".

The Fire Department changes and alters its operations to fit the needs of the weather.

"The safety of our town would be affected by the storms if we did not change our operations, but because we do, we can ensure safety for the people." Hoffman says.

The fire trucks, on the way to fires and emergencies, drive extra slowly due to the snow and ice.

Even with the past large amounts of snow already received this year, there is a large possibility of more to come.

In order to ensure safety in our town, Hoffman said "Anytime it snows, clear snow away from all near fire hydrants, so in case of emergency it is easy for fireman to find them and access them."

Also, he says to "be cautious of auxiliary heating systems, like fireplaces, stoves and chimneys."

"When we do get snowy conditions, people should stay inside and not drive until necessary. It makes our jobs much easier when we know the people are safe inside their homes." Hoffman said.

Township reacts to governor's call for longer day

"Our school calendar is antiquated both educationally and culturally," said Christie in a previous speech (NBC news). Many have argued that America is lagging in its educational system compared to that of international systems, and those who argue believe a year-round school calendar would catch America up.

Retired former WTHS A.V. Director, Theater Director, and Tech Crew Advisor, Mr. Rick Huff agrees that America has "more competi-

tion with Europe".

"Personally I think [changing the school day] should be done, but nationally." said Huff. He does however feel it would be difficult to manage because of after school activities, and contract adjustments with all staff members.

While there are many logistical aspects that play important roles such as staff contracts and busing, there are other factors that also need consideration. There is a question of whether it is just too much mentally and physically for students.

"I can see the pros and cons. But I don't think kids have enough of an attention span. Me personally, I feel like it would be too much." commented Kylie Giedemann '14. Some think that the already seven to eight hours kids spend daily in school is grueling enough.

"We already get up early as it is. Mentally, it would drain me out," said Mike DeLuca '14. Some students have a wakeup call as early as 6 am (even earlier if you squeeze in a gym work-

out or hair and makeup). Studies have shown that teenagers need the most sleep, and if the day gets elongated there could be high schools filled with the walking dead.

There have been mainly students who oppose the extension of school days and the overall year. Jasper Perle '14 does not feel there is a need to extend the day any longer.

"I don't think it's necessary, I think it is long enough as it is," commented Perle. Students believe that is not needed, and rather the two and half month summer break is imperative.

"I think everyone needs a summer," began Senior Brandon Odenath. "I need that free time to relax and spend time with family and friends. 180 days is more than enough time to attend school and be educated well enough to succeed as an individual."

Only time will tell if a longer school day and year will be chosen and if it will bring the children of tomorrow a greater success than their predecessors.

Smog seen from Space

China's increasing pollution raises concerns for environment

The Great Wall of China isn't the only man-made sight visible from space.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration has reported an alarming amount of smog over China's mainland near Beijing and Shanghai. This massive cloud of airborne pollutants are visible from NASA's Terra satellite, which produced a colored image of the smog while orbiting Earth on Dec. 7th.

Shanghai's central authorities closed schools and even banned professional sporting events while deciding on what to do about the hazardous situation.

Measurements from China show that Beijing's Air Quality Index has risen to 487, while Shanghai's was at 404. The total scale of 500 demonstrates that any toxin levels over 300 are regarded as dangerous.

Washington Township High School's S.A.V.E. club advisor, Ms. Pancari, finds that the increased levels of smog in China are not necessarily surprising.

Pancari explains that China's increasing population and recent alterations to their economy may have contributed to the growing cloud of smog, and that China's dependence on fossil fuels is certainly a heavy factor. Pancari hopes that China will at least take a few steps to improve their current condition, and that they will be more wary of their resources in the future.

"Your daily quality of life is severely impacted," says Pancari. "And it certainly has global implications."

Pancari goes on to say that the heavy reliance on fossil fuels, which is a contributing factor to increased smog, can negatively affect overall climate change in the long run. These types of problems become a major concern for the United States as Americans look for more efficient ways to use energy and utilize renewable resources for the future. Currently, the methods of obtaining these resources is a hotly-debated issue, and Pancari does not hesitate to offer her thoughts about the most harmful tactic

of getting these nonrenewable resources.

"Fracking, fracking, fracking!" exclaims Pancari. "It's such a scary thing." Fracking is the process of extracting natural gas from shale rock layers deep within the Earth, and it leads to many other problems within nearby vicinities. Fracking is important to our region as Pennsylvania is a prime location and environmentalists are concerned it could pollute the Delaware watershed

Pancari explains "people's water literally catches on fire [in fracking areas]" and that fracking is even connected to earthquakes. She elaborates on the fact that mountain top removal, or the act of blowing up a mountain and placing its debris in rivers, is an immense threat to the environment as well.

Pancari shares that government regulation is the easiest way to prevent drastic climbs in pollution or toxin levels. She firmly believes "subsidizing renewable resources to the degree of fossil fuels" would be of great use to the United States at this time.

S.A.V.E. member Louis Testa '17 agrees,

saying that "if anything, Beijing, or perhaps the entirety of China, should at least attempt to organize some regulations in their energy use." Testa explains one of the possible reasons as to why the smog even became such big problem was because of the substantial amount of vehicular exhaust and production in Chinese factories.

"Although most factory owners claim to use clean electricity that does not pollute the environment, the dark clouds seen from satellite imaging in space tell a different story," argues Testa.

Pancari adds to the conversation, saying that it is wrong to ignore problems with such a vast impact in so many other nations.

"I think that at one point we won't even be able to have this debate, because the damage will be so irreversible," she said.

China's blanket of smog is certainly raising a red flag not only in their country, but in numerous other countries as well. The pollution serves as a reminder that humans do have an impact on the planet, and that whether or not people know it, it can change their lives dramatically.

According to researchers at Berkeley University, weather conditions attributed to 1.4 million fatal car crashes from the years 1975 to 2000.

Consequently, safety on the

road is important as ever. While we've faced several snowstorms and temperatures dropping below 10°F, there are still many battles we have yet to face.

Driving instructor Mr. James Hallinan shared some tips for new drivers in tough weather condi-

"You need to keep extra distance when driving in bad weather. The number one accident is a rear end collision and any bad weather makes it more difficult to stop."

Stopping your vehicle is a major issue during stormy weather.

"Assume you may skid," Hallinan advised. "It's better for that to occur well in advance when approaching a stop sign or red light, then to skid closer to the intersection and possibly skidding into the actual intersection."

Although Steve DiTulin the ice or rain, he admits, "One just has to be mindful

that the ice will cause you to slip rather easily. With that in mind, one will remember to drive a bit more slowly, stop or brake earlier, and be more aware. You never know what will happen."

It is important to have a few essential items in your vehicle like a small shovel, gloves, and something to clean off your headlights with. Kitty litter is also important to keep on hand in tough condi-

"Kitty litter helps to get out of snow if stuck - pour some in front of and behind each tire and attempt to pull out (repeat as necessary)" Hallinan advised.

As well as knowing what to keep in your car, it is also important to understand your car.

"Do you have anti-lock brakes? Do you have 4-wheel or all-wheel drive? If not, do you have front or rear wheel drive? Do you have AAA to get towed if needed? These are the important questions we need to ask," said Hallinan.

Although it may be exciting to be driving in the snow or on ice for the first time, you need to wait for the right time and place to do it.

"Overall, the best advice is to avoid these conditions if possible. If you took an unnecessary risk and got into an accident, you will quickly realize it wasn't worth it.," said Hallinan.

Body image is one of those things that has always been a problem for teenagers all over the world. Both boys and girls are often pressured to have a "perfect" body.



Filled with boundless information and ancient artifacts, *One Day in Pompeii* is a great way for people of all ages to gain an education on one of the most historic cities of the past.


Being a lover of history, I am partial to museums and exhibits where I can learn more about past eras and events.

On Sept. 9, English indie rock quartet Arctic Monkeys released their highly anticipated fifth studio album AM. The slow churning and devious record is rightfully named AM. It is an after midnight nighttime stroll through the city; it is both dark and intimidating but wickedly thrilling.

Upon listening to the record I fell in love instantly. I would definitely categorize it as one of those albums where you love every single track. The album opens up with "Do I Wanna Know?" which captures a very James Bond theme song feel. It's essentially a cynical love song that explains the pain of unrequited feelings accompanied with a surging guitar riff and falsetto backing vocals from drummer Matt Helders. *AM* also features a reappearance of the single "R U Mine?" which released a little more than a year ago. The drummer and lead singer duo create a '90s west coast hip-hop beat using a traditional drum set alongside Alex's soulful Stratocaster riffs.

Sounds" which is certainly a break from the R&B influenced record. The track is so heavily reminiscent of a Lou Reed/ Velvet Underground composition, especially with the soft strumming and gentle vocals.

However, one of the standout numbers on the record has to be "Why'd You Only Call Me When You're High?". This track radiates all the grittiness of the late night romantic desperation of the city; somewhat of a 3 A.M. afterhours anthem. In this song you hear an obvious Eminem, Dr. Dre, and Outkast influence. Moreover "Knee Socks" which is a very upbeat dance floor song has Queens of the Stone Age's Josh Homme crooning a Destiny Child's style howling breakdown in the background. It has a distinct 1990s style dance beat to it and is one of the most up-tempo songs on the record.

AM is hands down the best album of Arctic Monkeys' career. I even take the liberty to claim it might be the greatest record of the last decade. 
British Artist an International Star

Frontman of RHCP Reveals All

The Red Hot Chili Peppers gained popularity in the 1980s and 90s, but have steadily crept back onto the scene over the years with recent releases like their "I'm With You" album from 2011. The band has won seven Grammy awards and sold over 80 million records worldwide. Lead singer, lyricist, and founding member Anthony Kiedis bares all in his memoir, *Scar Tissue*, released in 2004.

The frontman pens the book with the help of Larry Sloman, and is brutally open and honest with his readers. The book deeply explores Kiedis' drug addictions, his romantic and personal relationships, his love for California, and his spiritual journey to finding himself.

Spending his adolescent years engaging in drug use with his father, Kiedis developed severe drug addictions to cocaine, methamphetamine, various pills, and heroin.

In middle school, Kiedis meets his best friends and future fellow band members Michael "Flea" Balzary and Hillel Slovak. He describes their adventures together, like jumping off of buildings into swimming pools. Kiedis writes, "Adolescence is such a fun time in your life, because you think you know it all, and you haven't gotten to the point where you realize that you know almost nothing."

Kiedis discusses the death of his lifelong friend and fellow Chili Peppers founding member, Hillel Slovak. Slovak played guitar in the early days of the Chili Peppers, before dying of a heroin overdose in 1988 and after recording two records with the band.

"It's a myth that something like that scares you into going straight. Even when your close friend dies, you maintain a false sense of invincibility. You don't want to deal with your own wreckage, you just want to keep getting high."

Also documented in the book is the history and success of the band. They started in small clubs and have worked their way up to earning Grammies and selling out arenas. He reveals their trials and

fights and how music and the Chili Peppers are what finally got him straight.

Kiedis finally overcame his drug addictions for good in 2002. He says "I m still a little bent, a little crooked, but all things crooked, I can't complain. After all those

years of all kinds of abuse and crashing into trees at eighty miles an hour and jumping off buildings and living through overdoses and liver disease, I feel better now than I did ten years ago. I might have some scar tissue, but that's alright, I'm still making progress."


Literature appreciation


Champion comes out on top

Bliss in "The Abyss"

Eighth installment of popular RPG delivers

Easily one of the most popular games in the series, *Tales of the Abyss* is the eighth title in the Tales series. Featuring an extensive plot and compelling characterization, the game was originally released for the PS2 but was recently made into a 3DS reboot.

The story follows Luke Fon Fabre who lives a sheltered and pampered life as he is confined to his manor for protection. As a result, he possesses an incredibly arrogant and immature mindset, making him a dislikable character. His character development is satisfying, as it is compelling, to watch the selfish, turn into the selfless.

The cast of characters in *Abyss* are interesting, as the character relationships and development make the plot more compelling. Fans of the Tales series are often familiar with the character setups in each game, though the cast of *Abyss* subvert the stereotypes. Instead of being brave and courageous, Luke is the complete opposite. Though Guy fulfills the role of the cheerful childhood friend, it is implied that a hidden resentment of Luke remains suppressed. Anise, instead

of being the innocent child character, is instead a self-proclaimed gold-digger and the sympathetic mole of the party.

Each character has connections to another, and thus the story has a sense of unity instead of characters being out-of-place and irrelevant. I found it interesting how it took time for the main cast to truly unite together, mainly due to their annoyance with Luke's immaturity. The relationships instill heart and emotion into the plot, with the romance between Luke and Tear being the most notable, as it is subtle yet ties into the plot wonderfully. Another engaging character dynamic was Luke and Asch, as Luke discovers a secret regarding the two of them which alters his

The plot of the story is unique though fairly depressing at some points, such as learning the truth behind Luke's existence along with a high death toll due to many characters dying for a variety of reasons, such as the destruction of a mining town and sacrificing themselves in battle. However, there is much comic relief in the game to keep from becoming too gloomy. One indisputably negative

factor of the game was that the plot seemed to move slowly at times, especially in the beginning, when mass amounts of information are provided then seemingly dropped.
