Curriculum Updates

As remote learning continues, kindly extend your flexibility and compassion to our families as some home situations may be in flux and changing daily. Your dedication and support are deeply appreciated, and WTPS is so lucky to have such a remarkable staff. Thank you for all you do to support our students and families!

Guiding Principles for Elementary Remote Learning:

- Remember, **synchronized** <u>instruction</u>, face-to-face interactions, <u>should not</u> be utilized at this time; however, there are exceptions for CST meetings, related services, PSD, Autism, MD, and ESL instruction. Contact your supervisor if you have questions.
- Synchronized sessions, face-to-face interactions, <u>may be utilized for weekly greeting check-ins</u>. This will be for non-instructional purposes using WebEx or Microsoft Teams.
- Students continue to appreciate hearing from their teachers every day and receiving feedback.
- Lessons with new content should include a self-recorded video or voice over presentation as part of your instruction. Unless you are providing a read aloud, these mini-lessons should be no longer than 5 minutes of your overall timeframe.
- Continue to review the email of remote learning Dos and Don'ts for additional guiding principles.

Reminder on Daily Emails: Daily emails sent to families/students will occur between 8:00 - 9:30 a.m.

Free Resources:

• A plethora of online programs have been made available free of charge during remote instruction; however, many of these free options do not fully address our needs for differentiation, teacher interaction, and/or individualization in meaningful ways to support our curriculum. Any interest in specific programs should be explored with the knowledge and approval of a curriculum supervisor. Many considerations must be made when leveraging the use of a new program including long-term sustainability, program appropriateness, and district-wide consistency. Thank you for your continued support in this area.

Grade Level Considerations

Grades 1+2 ELA: New resources this week: As we head into Series books for Marking Period 4, new resources are available to help with your planning and (hopefully)make life easier. These were sent via email, but are also available through Teams (K-2 ELA folder):

- Grade 1: **Elephant and Piggie** mini unit: This is an **optional** three-week unit that integrates reading and writing priority standards for this marking period. The daily plan includes all links to Seesaw resources. Many thanks to Samantha Dulude, Katrina Stagliano, Lisa O'Brien, Kathy Saia, and Ellen Calandra for their help developing this unit. - Grade 2: **Cam Jansen** integrated mini unit: This **optional** three-week unit highlights the priority standards for the marking period, and integrates opinion writing and series book reading, with daily Seesaw teacher and student links included. Many thanks to Kristin Seymour, Samantha Dulude, and Kayla Ewing for their input and planning. Jamie Kirkpatrick and Jennifer Campbell have also developed Seesaw lessons using books from the **Frog and Toad** series, and the **Amelia Bedelia** series.
